"Glorious Riches" Lesson 1

Colossians 1:24 - 2:3

## <u>Intro</u>

Colossians is one of the four "prison" epistles, written by Paul while he was imprisoned in Rome. The church at Colassae was likely planted during Paul's third missionary journey. The congregations in churches Paul planted had similar problems spiritually. They faced a dual threat of their members either returning to pagan practices or to Jewish practices over their Christian new lives. There was also the possibility that old beliefs and practices would be added to the new ones. Teachers who taught this way might say something like, "Having Christ is important, but to be saved, you also need…" The added elements might be one of the Jewish practices from the Law of Moses, or some element of Greek philosophy. Both of these problems seemed to be present in the church at Colassae according to what Paul writes in chapter 2:8-15. But before confronting those problems, Paul first explains his own status, intent, and work.

## Read Colossians 1:24 - 2:3

1. vs. 24: Many of Paul's letters refer to a life with suffering

However, Paul never complains about this suffering Here, he points out that his sufferings have a *purpose* They are sufferings for the benefit of those he has brought to Christ

Paul connects his sufferings to Christ's

Nothing is lacking in Christ's sufferings, done for "the sake of His body,...the church" What is lacking in Paul is that his sufferings are not yet complete, as Christ's are Paul has suffered for the body of Christ, as Christ himself did The more he traveled, the more sufferings he encountered By the time his life was done, his sufferings in and for Christ were completed

2. vs. 25: Paul states three things about his life, his "calling"

He is a servant God gave him a commission, his job or purpose Paul says his purpose is to present to the Colossians "the word of God in its fullness" This is his purpose to all the churches he established, to each person he met

3. vs. 26: The "mystery" Paul refers to is the gospel message of salvation in Jesus
This message was hidden for a long time, but now it has been revealed
Even though Christ brought, modeled, and explained this, many didn't understand it
This shows how "mysterious" and hard to understand this message was
There are two important aspects to the gospel message
The first is the *personhood* of Christ
This is what Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John develop
They give evidence that Jesus was/is the Son of God
The second is the *work* of Christ
This refers to why His death, burial, resurrection and ascending are essential

The Gospels don't address this aspect of the message to any great degree The letters written by the apostles to the churches are the explanations This is how the message "is now disclosed to the Lord's people"

4. vs. 27: This verse makes several things clear

First, Gentiles were to be included in the message of salvation The mystery was being made known to them as well as to the Jews Second, the content of the mystery is simple—it's Christ It's not Christ in and of Himself, but "Christ in *you*" His is in us, fellow believers, and we are in Him Third, Christ's presence in us is "the hope of glory" Christ is the believer's hope for sharing in the glory of heaven Fourth, the riches he speaks of are spiritual blessings we receive in Christ
5. vs. 28: Paul says that he and other apostles are proclaiming Christ

They do this through admonishing (preaching) and teaching He also makes the goal of admonishing and teaching clear: "everyone fully mature in Christ" Fully mature means something that has reached its goal, its completion We know that human perfection is impossible, but we continue to strive for it We are commanded to be perfect by Christ Himself (Matt. 5:48) We don't lower the standard He set We keep aiming for it and asking forgiveness when we fall short We strive toward perfection by pursuing godly wisdom

6. vs. 29: Paul says he "strenuously contends" to achieve this goal of making Christians mature This is the goal of the church, and each member of the church To accomplish this goal, Paul does this with "all the energy of Christ" It is not by his own strength that Paul works, but with Christ's strength It would be evident to all who saw him work that Paul had Christ's strength

7. vs. 1: Paul tells the Colossians "how hard I am contending for you"

His contending is primarily through prayer, since he is not with them physically
He has the same zeal for them as Christ, in wanting them to grow spiritually
He says he does this "for all who have not met me personally"
This could suggest that he has never been to Colossae, or that these are newer converts

8. vs. 2: Paul's desire for them, what he is striving for, is for them to be encouraged He says "encouraged in heart"

The heart is the center of one's morals and ethics, one's will and attitudes He wants to encourage them to continue to be strong and grow in these areas He wants them to be "united in love"

He wants them to be united in having the same goals and purposes These goals revolve around their attachment to Jesus Christ Only a love built on Christ and a desire to serve others can unite the church Paul's third desire in the verse is for Christians to have "complete understanding" This understanding he calls "the full riches"—the best and end of all goodness He wants them to know Christ—that is the full riches This understanding is in contrast to the mystery he spoke of earlier What was formerly a mystery (Christ) can now be known completely This will help them distinguish between true and false teachings

9. vs. 3: Believers have access to the wisdom and knowledge of Christ Knowledge is the mental grasp of truth; wisdom is the ability to use truth appropriately Believers can access this wisdom and knowledge in Christ It is hidden from those who reject Christ This verse speaks against false teachers who claim to have "hidden truth" Only they and a select few know this hidden knowledge, they say But Paul says that Christ's knowledge is available to all who follow Him

Application: Paul here is being used by God to guide and protect the church, His body. This letter, like most of Paul's writings, is a call to alertness and action. They were to remain alert to wrong views of Christ, of wisdom, of power, or glory, of mystery, and all other things that have a bearing on their spiritual lives. Being alert about such matters allows them to then act appropriately to protect the church, since Paul cannot be there physically, and won't be able to be there throughout all of time to act as a protector. They need to develop the ability to do this themselves. This duty is in our hands today, as we are to do the same things for our churches that Paul wants of the Colossians—be alert and protect the truth of Christ.

Prayer: Father God, remind us constantly of your presence and Your power that is available to us through Christ. Help us to know Jesus so well that we are never fooled by false wisdom and false teachings. We pray these things in Jesus' name, Amen.
